Greetings

Much of what we have grown up knowing about food changes over time as researchers publish their developments. Calorie counting, the war on carbs, the idea that there are super food are all myths, according to Professor Tim Spector in his latest book "Food for Life" (available through Auckland Libraries). Prof Spector is best known for introducing the world to the wonders of the gut "microbiome", the mixture of "bugs" that help us digest our food, create chemicals and some vitamins, and are extremely important to protect us against heart disease, diabetes, high cholesterol, high blood pressure, obesity, and even some autoimmune conditions.

Ultra-processed foods have been creeping into our diets since the 1970s, and in countries like UK, the US, Australia, and New Zealand, around 50 percent of our energy comes from these ultra-processed foods, and probably about 70 percent of our children's. While such foods have fed us cheaply and have a long shelf-life, they have also affected us in many negative ways. They alter and can damage our gut microbes which might make us overeat. Prof Spector advises that we should gradually change our diets to eat many more plant types to help our gut microbes support our health. View, Google "Talks at Google Tim Spector Eating well' for a video of Prof Spector talking about the ideas behind his advice.

Our microbiomes and immune systems start to develop at birth - read how to boost your child's immunity in this month's magazine, as well as how vitamin B12 can give your life a boost. Don't forget that nurturing your own well-being is important, while those who are struggling in these tough times can seek advice at the CAB. In the Hobsonville area a community meal is planned for the end of July. This month Wills Week is a reminder that only half of New Zealanders have made a will, and leaving a legacy isn't only about money. Have you thought about creating an EPA? Have you thought about your emergency procedures? There is plenty going on in the community for you to find in these pages.

Auckland Council introduces fungus to combat weed

It's the weed Auckland gardeners love to hate. Tradescantia, better known as "wandering willie". A creeping ground cover with soft stems and glossy bright green leaves. Tradescantia is well suited to growing in the shade of



forests or in full sun. Arguably the most notorious pest weed to have escaped into the wild, it causes considerable damage to the natural environment, spreading along streams by water movement, infesting waterways and smothering native species. Auckland Council is for the first time organising the release of a fungal pathogen biocontrol in an urban environment to help control the weed.

Auckland Council's Senior Regional Advisor Pest Plants, Holly Cox says the council is excited about the long-awaited release of this biocontrol agent. "Tradescantia is very difficult to control and despite the best efforts of volunteers to manage the weed, they've been unable to make inroads. The yellow leaf spot fungus is an ideal control as it disperses itself with water movement and humid air movement spreading to other infestations both inside and outside the stream reserve."

The plants, infected with the yellow spot fungus (Kordyana brasiliensis), will be planted in the waterway and together with the tradescantia leaf beetle already present, it is hoped the fungus will further reduce the impact on the ecosystem. The fungal pathogen, native to Brazil, is host-specific meaning it only impacts tradescantia and is no risk to other species. Read more about this past

Visionwest

In June, Visionwest Community Trust opened the first social supermarket of its kind in Auckland. Named Manaaki Kai, the supermarket has been established in partnership with Foodstuffs North Island and will serve West Auckland residents.

Throughout West Auckland, many people live with ongoing food insecurity, struggling to afford good, nutritious food. In fact, 19% of our New Zealand children live in food insecure homes.

A social supermarket provides a dignified alternative a traditional foodbank where, rather than supplying pre-packed food parcels, those with a need for food support are able to self-select the goods they need. Shoppers are also guided through the shopping process so that clients can be supported with practical skills to plan and shop for healthy meals.



Operating like a small, regular supermarket, every grocery item in Manaaki Kai is given a points value. Shoppers are allocated a number of points depending on the size of their household. They can then select goods of their choice up to that points value.

Danielle Cleverdon, Head of Kai Services at Visionwest said, "It's about providing food support in a way that retains the dignity and mana of those who are receiving it. Each shopper is asked to contribute to help sustain the work of Manaaki Kai. This contribution adds to that dignity."

Shoppers at Manaaki Kai must live in West Auckland and must prebook a timeslot by visiting Visionwest's Whānau Centre, 67 Glendale Road, Glen Eden. More information is available on the Visionwest website: visionwest.org.nz/whai-manaaki-kai.



Times are tough

We've all heard it - mortgage rates are up, food prices have been soaring and most things just simply cost more and yet pay packets haven't kept up.

Most people you speak to have had to tighten their belts. For some it's been a case of deciding which TV streaming service to cut for others it's a struggle to heat their home or put food on the table.

Foodbanks say demand is up on last year, they have noticed people who have previously never needed to turn to a foodbank for help.

What help is available for people who are struggling?

There's quite a lot, if you know where to find it. The Government-backed website sorted.org.nz to help you budget, including a debt calculator.

Or you can get free, confidential advice through the Citizens Advice and its partner budgeting services

The CAB has also helped people withdraw their KiwiSaver because of financial difficulties.

Many of our clients simply don't have any financial buffers for any unexpected events, such as a car or major appliance breaking down.

When this happens, they sometimes feel like they have little choice but to borrow money, which causes further long-term financial difficulties.

What can people do to stop getting into further debt?

The longer you take to pay off debt the more it costs, so make a





Maurie Abraham retiring

After 11 years as Foundation Principal of Hobsonville Point Secondary School I will be retiring on 14 July.



Prior to starting here in 2012 I

was Deputy Principal and Principal of Opotiki College in the Eastern Bay of Plenty for 20 years. Before that I taught at Thames High School and Ngaruawahia High School. So it has been a long career with 30 years of senior leadership.

The opportunity to start a school from scratch was too good to resist. This involved working with the Board to establish an innovative, future-focused vision, appointing innovative, future-focused colleagues to work alongside and working with others to design and deliver an innovative and future-focused programme of learning and way of teaching.

It has been demanding but, ultimately, hugely rewarding.

How has it been demanding? We purposefully set out to design a school to be an institution more appropriate for learners born in the 21st Century. This has meant creating a school that looks so different to what our parents experienced and so different to what students in nearby schools, many of them often given the title of 'top' schools, were experiencing. Early on, especially, we had to hold our courage and communicate clearly what we were doing and why. We simply had to take our parent community with us.

Our focus was to push back against the idea of a school being an institution of assessment and, instead, focus on it being an institution of learning. We also wished to move the focus of a school away from being an institution of control towards one where we supported our young people to develop their self-regulation, their independence and their autonomy.

From the outset, we wanted our school to be one where adolescents could practise being adults, where it was safe for them to get it wrong from time-to-time and where they learn by getting it wrong.

At different levels what does this mean? It means: We have no bells so that students learn to self-manage. We are all on first name terms to recognise we are all adults. We do not have a school uniform so that young people can celebrate their diversity. We ignore NCEA





Level 1 so that we can retain the focus on learning, not assessment, and work towards quality qualifications at Level 2 and 3. We design learning programmes which combine specialist learning areas so that students understand how learning is connected. We provide opportunities for students to partner up with community groups and complete projects that solve problems for them. We focus on the learning of important habits so that students are more prepared to thrive in a changing world. We provide real-world learning opportunities through our strong internship programme

How has it been rewarding? Seeing young people be their unique selves, seeing how they respond when you trust them and give them opportunities to prove that trust, hearing them talking to our many national and international visitors about their learning and seeing staff flourish in such an environment are what makes it rewarding.

The biggest rewards come from seeing the odd, quirky young people who arrive here in Year 9 graduating as those still odd, quirky adolescents 5 years later as we have let them flourish as who they are.

I am sad to be finishing as I love coming to work but I know it is time for someone with another set of skills to lead the school into the future.

Our community has a unique school of which it can be proud. I've absolutely loved it.

Property market report

Market responds to RBNZ change in stance.

Economists say all three key drivers of the housing market point to a stronger market and house price gains, everyone's watching with a keen eye.

Kiwibank economists say they are expecting to see "some healthy green shoots" emerging in the spring housing sales season.

In Kiwibank's weekly First View publication, chief economist Jarrod Kerr and senior economist Mary Jo Vergara House say house prices are still falling, "but at a reduced rate".

"And sales activity is building upward momentum. There are signs of stabilisation."

They note that the REINZ data for the month of May showed further falls in house prices across the country.

"Wellington has seen the sharpest contraction in prices, falling 1.5% on the month to be down 25% from the November 2021 peak. Auckland is close behind, with house prices off 23% from the peak. They say they expect buyers and sellers to go into hibernation over winter. "And the true litmus test for the housing market will be in spring. We expect to see an uplift in confidence and activity over the warmer months." There are three drivers of the housing market.

"Firstly, the peak in interest rates should mark the bottom in the housing market correction. Falling mortgage rates will support confidence and activity.

"Secondly, the demand/supply imbalance will worsen. The surge in migration and the loss of dwellings at high risk in climate change will only exacerbate the housing shortage.

"And finally, the residential construction boom is coming to an end. The number of dwellings coming to market will fall back from very high levels. The growth in demand, with a migration boom, will once again outstrip supply in coming years.

"All three drivers point to a strengthening housing market, and price

gains,"

In Westpac's Weekly Commentary, senior economist Michael Gordon says the key things the Westpac economists are watching in the economy looking ahead are:

- 1. the state of the labour market,
- 2. the degree to which the inflation rate slows over the course of this year, and
- 3. the potential for a rebound in the housing market.

"The May REINZ figures showed that house sales have picked up from their lows and that prices have stabilised after a cumulative decline of around 17% since late 2021.

that will jeopardise a smooth and successful sale. The faster you can sell your property, and the greater the price you get for it, and the sooner you can move on.



Importance of smoke alarms in rental properties

Why everyone needs an Enduring Power of Attorney

The term "Enduring Power of Attorney" (or EPA for short) might sound scary to some people. When you break it down "Enduring" means lasting over a period of time and an "Attorney" is someone that acts on your behalf. So, when you put an EPA in place, it means that you are formally nominating someone to make decisions for you, over time. Your attorney can look after your personal wellbeing and/or property and finances in the event that you're medically unable to, or if you decide it's too much to manage yourself. You have the power to decide who acts as your attorney,



who they need to consult with (aside from yourself), determine conditions and restrictions and for property and finance matters, when the EPA comes into effect.

There are two kinds of EPA - one for personal care and welfare and a separate one for property. An EPA for personal care and welfare allows you to choose one person as your attorney. This is not a lawyer, but someone close to you who knows your wishes and who you trust to make important decisions about your health, accommodation and care. This EPA only comes into effect in the event that a medical professional determines you no longer have mental capacity.

On the other hand, an EPA for property gives you the option to appoint one or more attorneys to make decisions about your property, finances and legal contracts. This means they can pay bills, manage a bank account or buy and sell property on your behalf. You can determine whether it takes effect immediately, or only if you no longer have the capacity to make decisions. With this EPA you can also determine who your attorney/s need to consult with or provide information to and include restrictions and conditions to control how your assets are managed.



To future-proof the EPAs, we always recommend you appoint a back-up person called a successor attorney. This way, should your attorney be unable to act on your behalf or pass away, the successor attorney will be able to step in to make decisions.

Many people believe EPAs are only important to have as we get older, but this is not true. Anybody can lose capacity at any age or stage due to unforeseen circumstances, such as a stroke or an accident. If you do not have EPAs in place and you lose capacity, then it can be stressful, take a long time and be costly to apply to the court to appoint someone to be your property manager or welfare quardian (or both).

Having EPAs in place is like having an insurance policy and needs to be in place in advance. It is particularly stressful when a loved one loses capacity and by taking a bit of time now and getting these documents sorted, you could avoid a lot of extra stress (and cost) for your family down the track.







Are you aware of the new Drinking Water Standards?

Drinking Water Standards have been put in place to ensure all drinking water is safe for consumers.

The new Drinking Water Standards came into effect on 14 November 2022. If you own an unregistered water seller service, you had to have registered your service by 15 November 2022. If you own an unregistered drinking water supply (landlord, workplace etc that supplies water), you must register your supply by 15 November 2025, and will have further time to meet all the compliance requirements.

What are Drinking Water Standards? The Drinking Water Standards (the Standards) have been developed to make sure that all drinking water is safe for consumers. They set Maximum and Minimum Allowable Values (MAVs) for a range of different substances and characteristics that may be present in water. These include chemical,

radiological and microbiological contaminants. A MAV of a microorganism or contaminant is its concentration in drinking water above which there is a significant risk of contracting a waterborne (enteric) disease. The Standards apply to all drinking water supplies, except those serving a single domestic dwelling or household. They must be met at every point in a distribution system, from the point the water is treated to the furthest tap or outlet. While the Standards establish limits on the composition of drinking water the Drinking Water Quality Assurance Rules (the Rules) tell suppliers what they need to do to comply with the Standards. The Rules include monitoring and reporting requirements along with other assurance actions. Taumata Arowai is also consulting on the Rules. For further information, contact KPL to ensure your DRINKING WATER complies or inform you of the steps you need to take to comply.

July kitchen garden

Winter is officially here, but there is still plenty to do: prep for spring crops, new fruit trees to be planted and get winter crops in the ground. Sow green crops of lupin and mustard in any empty spaces in the vegetable garden for digging into the soil for green manure, refresh the soil for crops by adding new compost and sheep pellets.

Plant seedlings: broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, Brussels sprouts, silverbeet, spinach, onion. Protect from the cold while they are young and don't forget to protect seedlings from slug and snails.

Sow seeds: spinach, cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, lettuce, onions, and peas. Transplant to the garden as the weather warms and when they are showing at least two sets of true leaves.

Broad beans can be planted directly into the soil, stagger your sowing for a continuous harvest and feed all vegetables with a liquid general fertiliser. Plant new rhubarb then lift and divide old crowns, tidy up old strawberry beds and prepare for new plants. Feed your citrus with citrus fertiliser and make sure to water it in, feed all winter vegetables every two weeks.

Sprout new potatoes, stand them upright in a light dry place for them to sprout ready for planting and prepare the beds for when they are ready.

Protect your cauliflower, broccoli and Brussels sprouts by dusting them with derris dust to protect them from the white butterfly and the diamond back moth. Remember to get to the undersides of the leaves where the eggs are laid.

Get pruning of fruit trees underway as the trees become bare of leaves, remove all debris when you have finished and apply clean up spray to bare fruit trees, use copper spray and winter oil to stop bugs and diseases burrowing in for the winter. Spray citrus trees



with copper oxychloride to prevent brown rot and verrucosis. Plant or replace older fruit trees.

Plant new strawberries plants, they will show new leaves in the spring, feed with blood and bone as you plant. Garlic can still be planted this time of year.

Keep weeds under control; attack them when they are small.


Why do dogs tilt their heads?

West Auckland winery listed as a Category 1 historic place

The heritage values of a West Auckland winery whose buildings and associated landscape demonstrate the cultural diversity of our collective heritage and the development of viticulture in New Zealand have been recognised by the country's lead heritage agency.

Spearmint Sauce Recipe

Mint sauce is a traditional favourite often served with roast lamb, but is also delicious spooned over roasted or steamed vegetables and used as a base to make salad dressing, with the addition of olive oil and a little yoghurt.

Try this tasty and vibrant Spearmint variation using Spearmint tea. This recipe is from the Edmonds Cookery Book, 1984 edition.

Ingredients: 3 tablespoons Spearmint tea, boiling water (approx. 100ml), 2 tablespoons raw sugar, ½ cup apple

cider vinegar (approx.), salt and pepper to taste.

Method: Add the tea to a heat proof jug and pour over just enough boiling water to cover the tea and allow for expansion (about 100ml). Add the sugar and stir to dissolve it. Then add the apple cider vinegar to taste - about half a cup. Season with salt and pepper and it is ready to serve either warm or cold. This will keep in





the refrigerator for about five days.

Vitamin B12: Boost your life

Vitamin B12 deficiency is often discovered because people experience low energy. The good news is that low B12 levels can be increased easily giving you a real boost in energy and vitality. In fact, it is very common for people with chronic fatigue syndrome to have low vitamin B12 levels.

For some people, this can be achieved through your diet. Animal meats are the best sources. Vegetarians often become deficient in vitamin B12 over time. Supplements can also be useful. Tablets are available, but some people lack the enzymes necessary to absorb B12 from food or tablets.

The absorption of vitamin B12 decreases with age. For this reason, supplementation of vitamin B12 is recommended for most people

over the age of 60. For people over the age of 60 and those younger ones who cannot absorb B12, we need to use a form of vitamin B12 that bypasses normal digestion. This can involve drops or tablets that dissolve in the mouth which get absorbed straight into the blood stream. Some people may need injections of vitamin B12. These injections can be given by a pharmacist.

While energy and vitality are the best-known role of vitamin B12, it also has lots of other uses.

A vitamin B12 blood test is not always a completely accurate level of vitamin B12 status. For this reason, and the fact that vitamin B12 is incredibly safe, I often recommend patients don't bother testing and simply try supplementing and see how they feel.

So, in some circumstances that's the length of an entire football (or soccer) match.

This is why seemingly mundane tasks, such as picking up a piece of paper from the floor, can cause significant discomfort. It also explains why attempting to lift a heavy suitcase after sitting on a plane for hours can result in back pain.

To counteract the adverse effects of creep, we must prioritise movement - actually getting up and out of our chairs, our truck or digger seats often.

And if we cannot, we need to allow those tissues to retract and adjust - which can take up to 90 mins before we lift or bend forward.

Every 20-30 mins get up and walk around the desk/office/corridor/playground.

Or when you finish the job on the digger or once you reach your destination as a truck driver climb out do some gentle backbends and always remember - we've got your back.

Fear of missing something

All doctors have a fear of missing something, some diagnosis that eludes us no matter how hard we try, some patient we don't get to see because we are off on a weekend or some problem that creeps up that we did not get informed about.

For a patient, it's even worse because you might miss something important to your health and wellbeing.

In a climate where it's hard to get in to see a GP for weeks or you only get a phone or video consult without actual examination, every patient really needs to be looking after their own health and not just putting things off because "it didn't seem important at the time" or "the clinic did not contact me."

Personal responsibility for your health starts with these simple steps:

- 1) You know you best: If you have a symptom that is not going away after some over-the-counter medication, seek medical advice. If it is something urgent, call 111 for an ambulance. If you can't get into your GP, go to the nearest Accident and Medical clinic or Emergency Department. Be patient though as the wait might be long if you're bad enough to go there, you have to be patient enough to wait to be seen. Tell them how sick you are so they can accurately assess and triage you that means they will see you faster according to what is happening to you.
- 2) Better or you're back: If you are treated for a condition and you are not getting better, go back and get seen to again especially if you are worse.
- 3) Never one too many: If you have something going on that one doctor cannot seem to solve, ask for a second opinion, either in the same practice or from another provider.
- 4) Better to check and find nothing than to not check and miss



something: If you have persistent symptoms, ask for some tests because someone once said "life is like a box of chocolates, you never know what you might find..."

5) If you are referred to the public specialists, the usual time frame is up to 4 months - if you don't hear from them or you are getting worse - go see your GP who will write in to increase priority

Be proactive when it comes to your own health. The healthcare landscape is a huge sea of different situations, the only sure thing is keeping your own wits about you and hanging on tight.

Thinking about your emergency procedures

Over the past month there have been some major fires, one in Wellington, to a residential building claiming life, the other in Auckland that saw toxic clouds of fumes float over parts of Auckland.



Earlier in the year of course we had natural disasters in the form of floods hit Auckland and the North Island.

Natural disasters and other disasters such as fires and medical emergencies effects can be mitigated against to some extent through similar processes, understanding, planning and practice. Most of the items to consider will be valid for each type of disaster.

Have you considered your emergency procedures and tested them to ensure they are adequate recently? You should be practicing an emergency drill every six months.

In short; do you have an Emergency Plan which has been communicated, understood, tested and reviewed?

Personal safety - Have your alarms been tested, Are all emergency exits clear, Is there a clearly marked Assembly Point, When did you last conduct a trial emergency evacuation (6 monthly), Is your First Aid Kit adequately stocked, Are your First Aiders trained adequately, Do you have current emergency contact details for all workers, Are all workers trained in your Emergency Procedures - will they know what to do should an emergency occur, Are your Emergency Wardens adequately trained and familiar with their area of responsibility, Have you provided for emergency nutrition such as water, snack bars etc.

Property Safety - Is your building WoF current and are all systems tested and working, Emergency systems in place and working, eg emergency lighting, etc, Are there emergency shut down systems in place and working (gas isolation valves, power, machinery, etc), Do you have products etc stored in racking and shelving - is it secure, If you have Dangerous Goods onsite, is the storage appropriate, bunds empty and effective, signage, approved handlers etc all current, Do you have adequate Spill Kits and management systems

Business Security - How would your business systems stand up in an emergency, data security, confidential records, client databases. Are there backup systems and documents off site, Have you critically reviewed the level of your insurance cover recently, Are all emergency phone numbers displayed and understood. Has the list been reviewed recently, Are all your emergency phone numbers displayed and understood. Has the list been reviewed recently?

Upper Harbour Board

It's been a busy time for Local Boards recently. Let's not get started on the Annual Budget and sale of airport shares, but it has been and continues to be a stressful and contentious time for many. At the end of the day a compromise solution was reached and voted on by the Councillors and Mayor. The result for the Upper Harbour Local Board is a return of some but not all the funding that was going to be cut. Thank you to all who submitted and gave feedback on the important work that Local Boards do.



Early in July we will be voting on our work programme for the next 12 months. It contains the aspects that you, the community, have told us are important - it's slanted towards community and the environment as that is the feedback we received. It also contains some important Capex (capital expenditure) projects.

It feels like we rush headlong from one consultation to another, but there are some coming up that are really important.

Firstly, is the consultation on our Local Board Plan. This is a three-year strategic document that is developed in consultation with communities. It guides our investment, advocacy and work programmes over the next three years. It covers five key areas -Our People, Our Environment, Our Places, Our Community and Our Economy. We haven't started from scratch as we know there has been a lot of feedback already through the Annual Plan, the previous Local Board Plan and Peoples Panel Surveys so we have used these as a base. Consultation is open between 13th July and 14th August at akhaveyoursay.nz.

Secondly, is the Future Development Strategy. This will have impacts on Auckland's growth, especially in Whenuapai. The Future Development Strategy sets out how, where and when we should grow over the next 30 years. I believe we need to build the infrastructure first before we allow thousands of new houses in an area. 

June brought snow to West Auckland

The cold weather and showers didn't put off the thousands of locals who turned up at Royal Reserve on Sunday June 18 as the park was transformed into a winter wonderland for Snow in the Park.

This much-loved free community event was put on by Henderson-Massey Local Board who estimated that more than 4000 people turned up to this event.

The snow was delivered by Snowplanet in Silverdale, to create a tube run and snow play area where kids could make a snowman, snow castles or just play.

This unique event, which is the largest local board event, aims to bring families and neighbours together to enjoy the local park. Some children on the day were experiencing snow for the first time.

The additional free activities included a climbing wall, free face painting and delicious food.

This event has been put on for the local community since 2014 and continues to grow each year.

Funded solely by the Henderson-Massey Local Board, future events of this kind could be affected with budgets being cut that would see total local board operating funding reduced by \$16 million. The cost for an event like this is around \$65000.

The support from local community group partners like YMCA, Waitakere Army Cadets and many more coming together to run this event really helps.

With the annual budget adopted in late June 2023, the questions being asked is will this event continue and if so what will the 2024 event look like?

As outlined by the Auckland Council, funding may need to be sourced from elsewhere or the community may be part-charged to continue an event such as this.



Feedback sought on shaping Auckland's future

Auckland Council is asking for feedback on how Auckland should grow over the next 30 years, with public consultation closing July 4, 2023.

With half a million more people expected to live in the city by 2058, the draft Future Development Strategy is the council's plan to make sure homes, jobs and infrastructure are built in the right places, at the right time, while also building resilience to climate change and protecting the environment.

"The Future Development Strategy looks at the big issues around growth that affect our quality of life – things like where we choose to live and work, how we move around our city, our resilience to natural hazards and growing in a way that both reduces emissions and adapts to climate change, to benefit future generations," says Auckland Councill Planning, Environment and Parks Committee Chair Richard Hills.

"And we want to hear from Aucklanders on whether they think we have got this right."

The draft strategy recommends most of Auckland's future growth occurs in existing urban areas.

It also proposes delaying or stopping development in specific greenfield areas (undeveloped land) that have previously been identified for future urban development, due to natural hazard risk, impacts on our ability to halve emissions and the high infrastructure costs associated with development.

The Future Development Strategy also maps out Auckland urban areas most constrained by natural hazards and recommends a way to determine which areas might be prioritised for investigations into the best adaptation responses.

That means the release of some future intensive housing areas and flood prone areas could be excluded from development.

Auckland Plan Strategy and Research General Manager Jacques Victor says it's important for the city to have a clear, agreed plan for managing its growth.

Doing this now will ensure these are reflected in the next set of budget decisions the Auckland Council makes, he explains.

"The 10-year budget, also known as the Long Term Plan, which decides where Auckland Council's funds go over a 10-year period, is due to be refreshed early next year and so it is important we have the Future Development Strategy adopted by then so it can influence our investments."

What can Aucklanders have their say on?

The Auckland Council wants to hear from Aucklanders on the following proposals in the draft Future Development Strategy.

- 1. To focus most of Auckland's growth in existing urban areas, rather than growing more at the city edges.
- 2. To focus development near local centres giving people easier access to work, services,

facilities and shops by walking, cycling and public transport.

- 3. To avoid further growth in areas which are exposed to significant risk of environmental hazards (such as flooding and slips).
- 4. To prioritise nature-based infrastructure that responds to the impacts of climate change.

People can make a submission online through the Auckland Council website Future Development Strategy | AK Have Your Say (aucklandcouncil.govt.nz) before July 4.

Cato Bolam Consultants Planning Manager Kaaren Joubert says that, when finalised, the Future Development Strategy (FDS) will replace parts of the existing Auckland Plan 2050, the Development Strategy 2018 and the Future Urban Land Supply Strategy 2017.

She suggests it is well worth having a close look at what it proposes.

"Central government has driven change through its legislative programme, particularly through the National Policy Statement on Urban Development 2020 (NPS-UD) and environmental and climate legislation," says Kaaren.

"This change has significant implications on Auckland. The draft FDS responds to the NPS-UD, which requires councils to ensure there is at least sufficient housing and business development capacity to meet demand over the next 30 years.

"Based on what would be the total enabled

capacity under the council's Plan Change 78 as notified, the draft FDS does not identify any significant new areas for growth.

"However, it does outline a greater focus on where, how and when development take-up

She says short- to medium-term priorities (one-10 years) include Auckland Housing Programme priorities in Mt Roskill, Mángere and Támaki; Westgate, the city centre, and the Drury-Opakheke area.

"Beyond 10 years the council considers that longer-term prioritisation cannot currently be done with any degree of certainty."

The draft FDS also proposes removing areas for urban development in whole or in part due to hazard risks (such as natural, natural environment, natural heritage, highly productive land, cultural heritage), Kaaren explains.

"In the short term, the most constrained areas for future development that are proposed to be removed by rezoning to a non-urban zoning include Hatfields Beach stage 2, parts of Kumeû-Huapai-Riverhead, Takanini and parts of Drury-Opaheke.

"Areas with moderate exposure to hazards that are proposed for further investigation are Warkworth North-east and Warkworth South, Dairy Flat, Wainui East, Upper Orewa, Kumeû-Huapai (whole FUA), Riverhead, Albany Village 2 and Oruarangi 2."





Kaaren says the overall aim is to ensure that as much of the development capacity available is focussed in locations close to employment, services and rapid transit networks.

"The timing for introducing new (greenfields/Future Urban zoned) areas is generally pushed back from past planning timeframes and is based on infrastructure triggers (i.e. when all the required bulk infrastructure can be provided)," she adds.

"The implication is that wider areas where land is live zoned through plan changes, which cannot be serviced by existing bulk infrastructure, are excluded from at least the first 10 years. It is proposed to regularly review infrastructure programmes to ensure they reflect the latest information.

"The council plans to follow the principle that, where plan-enabled capacity is reduced or constrained, over time forgone capacity will be offset by creating additional capacity in such locations, so that overall capacity is broadly maintained."

Kaaren says rural residential growth is proposed to predominantly be focused on towns that provide services for the wider rural area, particularly rural nodes of Warkworth and Pukekohe with less growth in the smaller towns and villages.

Rural lifestyle growth is proposed to remain focussed into areas zoned as 'countryside living' and only a small amount of growth will be provided for in the wider rural area outside of Warkworth and Pukekohe.

"To implement the proposed directions the draft FDS identifies broad categories of supporting actions for its implementation as being - changes to the Auckland Unitary Plan (AUP); investment prioritisation; and advocacy, research and non-statutory approaches."

Where to from here?

Following finalisation of the FDS, a comprehensive implementation plan will be developed by the Auckland Council in accordance with the requirements of the NPS-UD.

It is envisaged that the implementation plan will be reviewed annually and updated as required to respond to emerging challenges and change.

At the close of the public consultation period the Local Boards' feedback will be sought during July 2023.

The council expects the proposed final FDS will be presented to the Planning, Environment and Parks Committee in September 2023 for adoption and it is unlikely submitters will be heard by the committee, Kaaren adds.

Flooding help and Hobsonville Road changes

Many North West businesses were lucky to escape major damage during the extreme weather events which hit Auckland earlier this year (Auckland Anniversary floods and Cyclone Gabrielle).

Those in low lying areas were worst affected.

The Auckland Business Chamber outlined some of the relief available, especially when a local state of emergency was declared.

Grants were offered to help businesses get back on their feet, the double whammy felt by some after suffering though earlier COVID restrictions.

About \$1 billion was also offered in Budget 2023 in May for further relief from extreme weather events and mitigation measures.

And the www.business.govt.nz website continues to have business information around extreme weather.

Auckland Mayor Wayne Brown has backed a flood risk reduction programme 'Making Space for Water' by supporting proposed "bluegreen" network solutions in suitable areas throughout the region.

At the June 22 Governing Body meeting, the Healthy Waters team identified waterways suitable for blue-green network solutions.

Blue-green networks, which link waterways (blue) and parks (green) with stormwater infrastructure, would make space for water to flow through the landscape.

In heavy storms, rainfall would collect in these areas reducing risk to people and property, the council explains.

"The initial evaluation of sites suitable for blue-green networks was based on risk assessments for flooding frequency and magnitude, and stability of surrounding buildings. More importantly, our teams gauged the rate water rises and the potential for entrapment or risk to life," Wayne Brown says.

"These projects will depend on property acquisition and central government funding, and will be developed, scaled, and delivered as funding permits."

The Auckland sites currently identified as suitable for proposed bluegreen networks include Wairau Creek (Totaravale, Lower Sunnynook, Milford), the Kumeu River, Waimoko Stream (Swanson), Opanuku Stream (Henderson), Porters Stream (Glen Eden), Whau Stream (Blockhouse Bay), Cox's Creek (Grey Lynn), Gribblehirst Park/St Leonards Road (Meola/Epsom), Te Auaunga Awa (Mt Roskill), Harania Creek (Mangere), Te Ararata Greenway (Mangere), and Whangapouri (Pukekohe).

The next step will be to develop risk profiles and some project objectives for each waterway.

The draft Tamaki Makaurau Recovery Plan - with sections to be released as work programmes are finalised, includes 'Making Space for Water' and the proposed blue-green networks.

Wayne warns that flood and storm recovery will be complex and requires community engagement, so may take some time.

During July a briefing will be held for all Local Board members to discuss 'Making Space For Water' with the final programme due to go to the Governing Body for consideration in September.

Auckland Council's Recovery Coordination Office will continue to engage with central government to define the arrangements for funding recovery efforts. The funding split and costs have still to be worked out.

Meanwhile, initial feedback closed on June 30 for a proposed Hobsonville Road Cycleway.

Auckland Transport (AT) is working to deliver a connected safe cycle network across Auckland with the Hobsonville Road Cycleway aiming to provide safer access for cyclists to the Hobsonville Ferry Terminal and the new bus interchange at Westgate serving the Western Express (buses run between Westgate and the city centre every seven or eight minutes during peak periods later this year).


It also links local users to businesses, retail, entertainment, and schools. The cycleway will be on both sides of the road between the current kerbs and avoid disruption to services, without widening Hobsonville Pond

AT is prioritising the implementation of protected cycleways, with some form of physical separation between traffic and people on bikes or micromobility – such as e-scooters, so the Hobsonville Road cycleway will include some form of separation – just what that is will be determined after consultation.

Funding has been allocated from the Climate Action Targeted Rate (CATR) to deliver a cycleway along Hobsonville Road - an important connection for the cycle network, linking up cyclists to the north and to the west, including the Northwestern Path to the City Centre and beyond.

Supporting Growth is planning for future transport Investment in NorthWest Auckland growth areas including Hobsonville and Whenuapai.

Hobsonville Road is identified as a future strategic transport corridor and planning has been undertaken to protect land for future implementation of the required strategic corridor.



A Notice of Requirement (NoR) was lodged by AT on December 19, 2022, to alter the existing road widening designation on Hobsonville Road.

The long-term plan includes widening Hobsonville Road in about 10-15 years.

AT says some safety concerns were raised about a two-way cycleway including the potential of it being confusing for drivers coming out of side roads and driveways. This design would have required AT to signalise a lot of the intersections and could cause traffic delays for drivers.

Much of Hobsonville Road's on-street parking could be "repurposed" as arterial roads generally have little or no on-street parking to keep the route working efficiently.

Safety improvement may include some intersection layout changes including some raised speed tables, investigating signalising Brigham Creek, Trig Road, and Luckens Road intersections, new pedestrian crossings, and changes to bus stop waiting areas.

Feedback will help inform the preliminary design for the Hobsonville Road Cycleway, with a detailed design expected to available later this year or early 2024 and construction likely to star mid-2024.

Westgate's growth



The story of Westgate's growth started back in 1997 when NZRPG purchased the original land which is now Westgate Shopping Centre. At the time, work on a planned retail development site had never begun. The new owner (NZRPG) got to work and by Christmas 1998 the first shops opened and Westgate was born.

By 2002 the old Waitakere City Council proposed a plan to create a larger town centre, and NZRPG took on the challenge to plan and build a destination that offers a unique mix of retail, residential, entertainment and commercial precincts around a planned design.

Fast forward ten years and Westgate Town Centre is a metropolitan hub for the large and rapidly expanding communities of Auckland North Western region

Home to all but one of New Zealand's major retail anchors, the Westgate Town Centre comprises New Zealand's largest Mitre 10 and Bunnings stores, alongside three identifiable shopping precincts: Westgate Shopping Centre, Westgate Lifestyle and NorthWest and in late 2022 the first Costco store in New Zealand opened. The Town Centre is, and will continue to be, a community hub for the people of West Auckland.

Westgate is home to Te Manawa, Auckland Council's first fully integrated community facility. Even with an immense amount of construction ongoing, Westgate Town Centre still has a green heart with the Te Hauauru Reserve, a new recreational area, and Kopupaka Park, a


project that won awards at the World Landscape Architecture Festival.

Westgate is an important part of Auckland's growth capacity and will continue to develop over the next 10-15 years. Construction capacity of around 15,000 homes is currently provided within the direct catchment of Westgate. Population growth of over 80,000 is anticipated by 2048.

What we expect to see over the next 2-5 years will be a mixture of retail, commercial and residential offerings in the heart of Westgate Town Centre. The obvious reality is the need to expand away from the city centre and create suburban hubs to enable the CBD to maximise its potential and fuel the economic growth in the areas surrounding Central Auckland.

Looking ahead, a lot of work has been done to identify the growth hubs for Auckland and Westgate is one of these.
