Greetings

It is interesting and useful to read two books about the same subject that have completely different opinions. The first I read covered the familiar stories about how man-made global warming has created increasing concentrations of "greenhouse" gases associated with the burning of fossil fuels particularly over the last 150 years. Recently the levels of, in particular, carbon dioxide have increased more rapidly. There is loss of ice in Antarctica and more acidity in the oceans.

The second book provided a sincerely-presented and persuasive analysis of the conventional understanding of the issues. It quoted numerous scientific opinions and research that conclude that virtually all of the assertions of the scientific basis on climate change are incorrect. The climate has changed in the past, and there is no consensus in the scientific community. The temperature readings which indicate a warming trend are taken in warmer areas such as cities, so the evidence is flawed and changes in the sun's energy may be heating up the earth. In fact we are heading into an ice age. Glaciers are growing and the sea level rise is exaggerated, and is due to changes in the ocean floor. The oceans are cooling and acidification isn't serious.

Clearly both views cannot be correct, so we should check the accuracy of what we read, especially on social media.

You can be confident of the accuracy of what is on offer in our locality, just look through this month's Westerly for ideas. If you or a family member might be considering a retirement village, read about what's available locally. Do you have grandchildren overseas? Read a new book by a local author - links are in the article. Look out for the new health facilities that are opening in the neighbourhood, as well as our usual health suggestions. Have you thought about giving your time to the community patrol?

If you are involved with house maintenance there is plenty of support available, and now is a good time to be planning next summer's garden. What about trends in the property market? Read Graham's column to find out. There are some tasty food outlets on offer. See the new ideas in the pets section. With massive growth underway in the North West area bringing a new town centre at Westgate, 5500 new dwellings in the Hobsonville Point area and growth in the Marine Industry, volunteer patrollers are rostered to work in pairs and give as many hours as their schedule will allow. They have full backing from NZ Police (while remaining financially independent) and are the eyes and ears for Police gathering

intelligence and reporting incidents.

Massey/Westgate/West Harbour/Hobsonville/Hobsonville Point/Herald Island/Whenuapai and Greenhithe patrol (known as Massey Patrol) are responsible primarily for our area covering areas tasked by Massey Police, patrolling neighbourhoods, particularly where there has been a spike in crime, major carparks and just providing high visibility within the community. Massey patrol use Massey Community Police Station as their base. Patrols cross borders when required, covering "hot spots" in other local areas or major events such as missing children/elderly. All patrols are logged onto the Police DCC (District Command Centre) for safety purposes and have direct access to Police Communications.

Netsafe

If you experience online bullying, abuse or harassment based on your colour, race, ethnicity or nationality, you should be aware that the Harmful Digital Communications Act tackles some of the ways people use technology to harm others online. This Act aims to prevent and reduce the impact of online bullying, harassment and other forms of abuse and intimidation. Under New Zealand's Human Rights Act, it is illegal to discriminate on the basis of who you are, in many areas of public life. If you have been abused in this way, talk to someone you can trust, a close friend or whānau, or contact Netsafe, Need to Talk, Lifeline or Youthline. Save texts and emails and take screenshots of anything that might disappear later. Make sure you keep track of dates, what has happened, who you think did it and why. Enriching your loved one living with dementia

When I started working at a rest home for people living with dementia I was fascinated by the range of activities offered to the people living there. 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

Property market report

National house prices rose less than 1 per cent from May to June and sales volumes dropped 5 per cent. Real Estate Institute data showed May's median prices of \$817,500 rose marginally to \$820,000 in June, up just 0.3 per cent. Sales numbers fell from 7720 sales nationally in May to 7345 sales last month.

Auckland's median rose only 0.2 per cent, from \$1.14m to \$1.15m and sales volumes also fell 2.4 per cent from 2834 to 2766.

Rising house prices through the country are certainly one of the main drivers for the Reserve Bank's decision to increase the OCR.

Michael Gordon, Westpac's acting chief economist, said the current data "showed that the New Zealand housing market remains strong, but is cooling off relative to its white-hot pace at the start of this year. Sales were broadly flat, while prices rose at a slower pace than in previous months.

"We estimate that June sales are down about 1 per cent in seasonally adjusted terms. Sales are still running above pre-Covid levels, and indeed they were still higher than in June last year, which marked the start of the post-lockdown rebound in activity," Gordon said.

The return of loan-to-value restrictions and the recent tax changes have contributed to some cooling-off of demand for investment properties, although the evidence to date suggests that homebuyers have been quite willing to step into the gap created, he said.

"That could change once mortgage rates, in particular the one and two year fixed rates, start to rise from their lows, as the prospect of OCR increases loom, Gordon said.

"For some time, the Reserve Bank has been holding off on bringing out interest rate hikes to tackle the housing price increases, because the rest of the economy wasn't ready for higher interest rates. Now it is," Jones said.

"We'd expect mortgage rates to start rising in advance of this, flipping what has been a tail wind for house prices into a slight headwind. We'll get an update on the Reserve Bank's thinking," Jones noted.

Jen Baird, REINZ chief executive, said median prices increased by 28.7 per cent from \$637,000 in June 2020 to \$820,000 last month.

"Additionally, five out of 16 regions reached new record median prices, one region saw an equal record and 20 districts reached new record median highs," Baird said.

The median house price for Auckland rose 25% year on year to June 2021 to reach \$1,150,000.

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Healthy homes standards

On 1 July 2019 the healthy home standards became law. This introduced certain standards for heating, insulation, ventilation, draught stoppage, moisture ingress and drainage in rental properties. These standards are aimed at ensuring that rental properties are healthier and safer and have lower maintenance costs in general.

All private rentals must comply within 90 days of any new tenancy entered into after 1 July 2021 or any existing tenancy renewed after 1 July 2021. All rental homes must comply with the healthy home standards by 1 July 2024. All boarding houses must comply by 1 July 2021 and all houses rented by Kainga Ora (formerly Housing New Zealand) and registered Community Housing Providers must comply by 1 July 2023.

Plan b for home buyers: buying off plan

With house prices still skyrocketing, it seems that there is an upward trend for first home buyers to buy new builds off the plan. At the moment there are various developers selling apartments, terraced housing complexes and new subdivisions off plan.

The obvious benefit that makes off plan buying more attractive, is that these properties are sold through negotiation with the developer and not at auction. You have time to withdraw your KiwiSaver funds and may even qualify for a HomeStart Grant of up to \$10,000 each on a new build property.

Some developers offer good value for money and sometimes even throw in a furniture package and yes, everything will be modern and brand new once your home is built!

Potential drawbacks are the long wait and the market uncertainty. Will the property still have the value of the purchase price when it is finished? Sometimes what is marketed on websites and brochures are only rough illustrations, and not how the finished house or development will ultimately look. You also usually need to pay a 10% deposit now and fully commit to the purchase with an estimated completion of 1-3 years. If something changes in your personal



circumstances between signing the contract and completion, you could end in hot water and not getting a mortgage or even worse, you can end up losing your deposit!

We help our clients through this daunting process by doing a thorough review of the off-plan agreement to highlight the risk and to help navigate an overwhelming agreement which could easily be up to 80 pages.

Some ways to protect yourself in this process is to ensure the deposit is held by as stakeholder until both the Record of Title and Code of Compliance Certificate have been issued. If for any reason either of these are not available then after an agreed period of time a sunset clause provides for the purchaser to be able to cancel the contract and have the deposit refunded to them - this is particularly necessary if a developer or builder goes under half way through a development. Sometimes we see a sunset clause being available to both the developer and the purchaser - in all cases you want to try and get the sunset clause to only to be for the benefit of you as the purchaser.

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Central's Tips

August 2021



Plant potatoes to crop in time for Christmas dinner, and get the seed sowing underway (indoors). Do some herb garden maintenance, and sow mesclun for summer salad. Snails are wintering over, so go on the attack!

Planning ahead

Manage the colour of your hydrangea flowers, more pruning to do and a great time to plant hedges. Shop for trees and shrubs this month as possible shortages of varieties may loom and go looking in the garden for signs of new growth



In the Edible Garden

- **Prepare a potato patch** – Plant sprouted seed potatoes by digging a trench and cover lightly with soil. Every few weeks 'hill' up the soil, covering the foliage to leave only the last set of leaves
- **Sowing seeds indoors or under cover** is a great way to feel like you're starting the summer vegetables, even if it's still cold outside. Start tomato, capsicum, eggplant and zucchini seeds now
- **Herb garden maintenance:** lift and trim the roots of mint, then replant. Mint increases its root size very quickly in proportion to its foliage growth and will be invading the rest of the garden! Other herbs such as thyme and rosemary can be trimmed and tidied to make way for new growth
- **Rosemary is a versatile herb for structure in the vegetable potager.** Upright varieties make great hedges and prostrate types spill elegantly over the side of raised beds. Their blue flowers brighten winter gardens and keep the bees around
- **Mesclun and rocket** can be sown directly now, in preparation for mixed leaf summer salads
- **Snails** will be wintering over in old cabbage, kale and silver beet leaves. Cull them or use bird friendly bait to restrict their populations or all your new seedlings will disappear overnight

The rest of the Garden

- **Get the flower colour you want:** hydrangea flower shades reflect the type of soil they are growing in: to be certain of blue flowers, spread aluminium sulphate (often sold as Hydrangea blueing tonic) around the bushes. For pink flowers, use lime around them instead. But remember, white flowers stay that way and white hydrangeas prefer do best in light shade
- It's also **pruning time for hydrangeas and hibiscus.** Thin out the dead wood and cut back to budding leaf nodes, making clean cuts
- Late August is a great time to **plant hedges** and perennial borders for the summer garden. Mulch after planting and, when planting perennials, remember the snail advice given above
- **Clear areas in the garden where bulbs and deciduous plants are beginning to emerge through the soil** – this exposes them to light and sun and encourages growth
- **It's peak 'tree season' at the garden centres and nurseries.** This year don't delay in making your choices – most budding of fruit and ornamentals is done two years before the plants hit the marketplace and 2022 could see shortages of popular varieties as a result of the 2020 lockdown

Project for August

Tree planting

Deciduous fruit and ornamental trees are traditionally planted when they are dormant. This reduces transplant shock and allows them to come into leaf and flower as they adjust to their new situation. Using Garden Mix or Nutrasoil in the planting hole adds fertilisers and compost to condition the existing soil. If you're digging into clay soil, add a handful of gypsum in the bottom of the hole to soften the clay pan and allow roots to penetrate. Mulching and staking will improve tree establishment as the season warms up and spring winds arrive.

Growing fruit trees

You will want to choose a sheltered, open sunny spot for your fruit trees, with good drainage.



Once you have chosen your tree or trees, (remember some trees need a pollinator) prepare your site well. Dig a hole that is slightly deeper than the root depth of your plant and partly fill with a good garden mix. Place some slow release fertiliser tablets in the bottom as well. Most of our fruit trees are recently potted, having come to us bare rooted. The soil in the bags will be loose and the roots of your fruit tree must be kept moist. Try not to disturb any new roots developing. Before back filling the hole, position the tree stake so you do not damage any roots. Firmly compact the soil, making sure your tree is no deeper than it was in the pot. Water well. Water is very important when growing new trees, and regular watering in dry periods over spring and summer is a must. Mulch your trees, which will conserve moisture, protect the roots, add nutrients and prevent the growth of weeds. Make sure you do not have to mulch too close to the trunk. Getting ready for winter

The changing season also sees the leaves changing colour and falling, they do look spectacular but can be a nuisance, and so collecting leaves and clearing the gutters before the winter rains come are important tasks too. Kanika Park Cat Retreat

You can't chat with your cat, but there are many ways to know how your cat feels.

Cats love to feel in control of their environment. When they do, they will mark their home using facial markings and leave "happy messages" (or pheromones). This happens when your cat rubs its face against furniture or nuzzles up against your legs.

Things that may disturb your cat's need of stability and impact your cat's behaviour. For instance, every time you move furniture, bring in new furniture, do a major housecleaning, renovate your house etc... This can remove the "happy messages" left by your cat

Other things that may affect your cat's happiness are access to food, heat, water, litter, attention and competition in the household with other cats, as well as visitors to the household.

Perhaps the biggest change that your cat can go through is moving home. Entering a new home with none of the "happy messages" on the walls will create a big stress for your cat.

At Kanika Park Cat Retreat your pussy cat will have its own room, with plenty of places to relax eg: on a cushion, in a bed, on a shelf or blanket.

Responsible cat ownership

Responsible cat ownership has not really been a thing in New Zealand, and is not mandated by government as it is in many parts of Australia. However increasing numbers of people are starting to keep cats differently, for a variety of reasons.

Leonardo is a 2 ½ year old ragdoll cat who lives with his family in Hobsonville Point. For the first 16 months of Leonardo's life, he stayed inside, and now only goes out a few daytime hours each day. His owner, Maylene, explains that her previous cat was injured either by a car or in a fight with another cat (they never found out which) and what followed was ongoing health problems and "astronomical" vet bills.



While staying inside, Leonardo is entertained by a few toys and games with his owners. He goes out while Maylene is at home, then asks to come back in. "He really seems to like his mostly inside life". He has never been hurt, and a side benefit, Maylene says, is that she doesn't "have to deal with gross dead things" on her doorstep. If they move to a house with a suitable back garden, Leonardo's family would consider getting a cat proof fence. There are several available in New Zealand now, including small electric wires and clever spinning devices such as the Oscillot system (<https://catfence.nz/about-oscillot/>).

Other benefits of keeping cats safe and indoors in the daytime include fewer illnesses such as Feline AIDS which is surprisingly common in New Zealand and spread through bite wounds, happy neighbours, a longer-lived cat, and better protection for some of our vulnerable native birds.

Achilles tendinopathy

Do you suffer from painful Achilles tendinopathy? Do you have pain at the back of your heel but not sure why? Painful to walk in the morning? Can't figure out how to relieve your pain? We may be able to help you.

What is an Achilles tendon?

Achilles tendon is a strongest and largest tendon in our body. It is a fibrous cord that connects muscles at the back of your calf to your heel bone. It controls the smooth transition of our body weight onto the toes by lifting our heels. Also, it is one of the most active tendons in the body especially when you walk or run because it stabilises our body.

How does it occur? Achilles tendinopathy is an overuse injury where it presents with pain, swelling and stiffness of the Achilles tendon. Achilles tendinopathy develops when you over-strain or overload your Achilles tendon repetitively.

Individuals who put repetitive stress on their ankles and feet, such as manual labourers & athletes are at higher risk of developing Achilles tendinopathy.

The Achilles tendon attaches to the calf muscles, so tight calf muscles can increase tendon strain. Therefore, it is essential to do



calf stretching.

In addition, people with certain foot posture or gait styles, have a tendency to develop Achilles tendinopathy due to the greater demands placed on the tendon when walking. If these individuals wear shoes without appropriate support, their uneven loading patterns could further aggravate the Achilles tendon.

Symptoms

-Aching, stiffness, soreness or tenderness in the back of the ankle or heel.

-Tenderness, or intense pain, when the sides of the Achilles tendon is squeezed.

-Lump on the Achilles tendon. When the disorder progresses to degeneration, the tendon may become enlarged and may develop nodules in the area where the tissue is damaged.

Treatment options - The first and most important step is ensuring you have a good pair of footwear to decrease the load on the Achilles tendon and stretching your calf muscles. If you do this and continue to have pain, give the team at the Hobsonville Podiatry a call on 09 390 4184. They can help determine why the pain won't settle & then provide appropriate treatment.

Sleep: Not worth stressing about

Sleep is not just a state of rest, but includes several states which help us to restore physiological function, store memories, clear metabolites, and even tweak our model of the world and increase our understanding of the world. Sleep also helps us keep our circadian rhythm which influences our metabolism.

Despite the obvious importance of sleep, I never tell people that sleep is critical to health.

Stress, anxiety or worrying about sleep increases the levels of your stress hormones cortisol and adrenaline. Cortisol has the job of getting you up and going in the mornings. Adrenaline has the job of giving you a jolt of energy to get you away from that tiger in the wild. It's not rocket science that stress-induced increases in cortisol and adrenaline are no good for sleep.

Don't Watch The Clock:

If you check the time when you wake up, then this can raise your stress levels. Depending on your clock, you may also get a dose of blue light which reduces sleep too. The retinal ganglion cells in the

eye are not involved in vision, but detect the levels of ambient light, especially blue light, to influence the sleep - wake cycle.

A Helping Hand:

If your sleep gets out of balance for too long, you may need something to help you get back into your rhythm. Sometimes a relaxing Epsom salts bath with a hint of lavender oil will be enough. A cup of chamomile tea can also be helpful. Setting up good practices from early evening until bedtime is essential. This is often termed "sleep hygiene". We have a sleep hygiene information sheet to assist you (free of charge).

If you are over 55 years of age, we can prescribe you melatonin (your natural sleep hormone). Is my gut really leaky?

First and foremost the answer is no because 'leaky gut' doesn't really exist. Our gut is not a pipe that 'leaks'. It is actually more complicated than that and that is why the term is generally not recognised by medical practitioners.

The correct term is 'intestinal hyperpermeability', which is a bit of a mouthful, hence why the term 'leaky gut' tends to be used. Intestinal hyperpermeability just means that our intestines let in food molecules, bugs and chemicals into our bloodstream that shouldn't be there because the system is currently 'broken'.

Our gut is one big tube (like a tunnel) and food travels through the tunnel. Along the tunnel there are gates, these are controlled by our cells and a protein called Zonulin is the 'gatekeeper'.

Certain foods increase Zonulin and allow the gates to open such as black pepper, capsaicin (from chilli), hops (used in beer) gluten, saturated fat (esp, coconut oil), too much omega 6 fatty acids in relation to omega 3 fatty acids, sugar and alcohol plus deficiencies in zinc, vitamin A and Vitamin D. Certain medications, stress (to allow in more nutrients) and inflammation will also mean that these gates open. This is a natural, normal process and is dynamic - the gates



open and close all the time. The problem comes when you have a poor diet, chronic inflammation, unresolved food intolerances, and gut infections that can mean the gates don't close properly and that can drive inflammation elsewhere in the body because of the substances that get into the bloodstream that ordinarily wouldn't be allowed there. This has been associated with diabetes, cardiovascular conditions, allergy, autoimmunity and mental health disorders.

A diet rich in vegetables, whole foods, legumes, nuts and seeds, fermented foods & fish (i.e. the Mediterranean diet) can make a massive difference and allow the gut to heal itself.

Emotional situations that trigger overeating

If you're an overeater, different situations trigger emotions that send you to the fridge (or dairy) even though you're not hungry. Or, cause you to overeat when you've had enough.

To reduce overeating learn to cope with feelings in healthier, non-food related ways, on your own or with the help of family, friends or professional. Here are ways I deal with these situations:

Boredom: read a book, jump on trampolines, do something creative

Anger: movement helps the most so I dance in the lounge, I yell in the car with the music loud or I journal the anger out - I don't hold back, just let it rip onto the paper

Stress: meditation, deep breathing, listening to a hypnosis track

Fear: deep breathing and facing the fears - speaking up when I'm afraid or saying no when I fear I'll be rejected if I don't say yes

Lonely: reach for connection - walk with a mate, catch up coffee, phone call

Self-Esteem: affirm I am enough no matter what, focus on the good in me, praise myself

Happiness: many people connect happy events to food as we learnt to celebrate with food - try finding other rewards like booking an activity or adventure. Connect and do things that bring happiness without food like dancing, swimming or singing out loud to my favourite music.

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weeks, shaking daily. Strain the liquid from the herbs ensuring you wring out any liquid. Add the honey to taste.

\$12.6 million upgrade

Waitematā DHB has welcomed a \$12.6 million cash injection to upgrade the Central Sterile Services Department (CSSD) at North Shore Hospital, due to start in January 2022. The funding comes from a \$12 billion infrastructure package, announced by the Government in 2020, in which \$300 million was earmarked for the health sector.



Waitematā DHB Chief Executive Dr Dale Bramley says the upgrade will enable the service to meet future demand as the local population grows. Waitematā is the largest DHB in the country, serving a population of around 650,000 across the North Shore, Waitakere and Rodney areas. This number is expected to reach nearly 700,000 by 2025.

"North Shore Hospital's CSSD sterilises more than two million medical devices each year for re-use in operations and other procedures across the DHB," says Dr Bramley. "This upgrade will support a more modern facility that will help strengthen health services in the rapidly growing Waitematā area."

The announcement of the CSSD upgrade comes at the perfect time; the department will be busy over the coming years, with a number of exciting developments underway within the Waitematā district, including a new 30-bed inpatient ward at Waitakere Hospital (2023) and a major upgrade of Waitakere Hospital's Special Care Baby Unit.

St John Health Shuttle - free community service

The two West Auckland Area Health Shuttles transport people who live in the West Auckland region to their local health-related appointments, and then brings them home again when they are ready. The shuttle service is staffed by St John volunteer drivers and while the service is free, people are encouraged to make a small donation where possible.



Examples of the many health related reasons people use the shuttle service are, for an appointment at the Waitakere hospital or a local

West Auckland medical centre, a visit to the physio, dentist, or to a specialist consultation, or maybe there is the need for a scan, or a blood test.

Despite Covid disruptions in the first five months of 2021 the West Auckland Health Shuttles have completed 1120 journeys travelling over 15,000 km's, safely delivering people to their local appointments. This includes many people who for a variety of reasons may have difficulty in walking, climbing steps, or who are in a wheelchair. Both the shuttles are fitted with wheelchair hoists making entry and exit to the shuttle very easy no matter what a person's mobility issues are.

The free Shuttle service is available to everyone who lives in West Auckland and who has a health-related appointment in the West Auckland area. To make a booking, you simply need to phone the St John Shuttle booking number on 0800 9252 672. (NB Return journeys are not available after 2.30pm)

To be able to provide you with the service you require, we need you to make your shuttle ride booking with us a minimum of 24 hours in advance.

If you have a regular appointment, you can make a series of bookings in advance. If you don't require a pre-booked service on a particular day, please let us know at least 24 hours in advance.

Grandparenting

A Hobsonville Point author has just published her first book. Helen Ellis is a New Zealand researcher, writer and anthropologist who with her husband has been a distance parent for over 30 years and a distance grandparent for over 20 years with family at some time in Europe, Scandinavia, Africa, Asia and America. After a career in travel, event management and business ownership she undertook university studies and began researching the how the impact of being separated from families affects all generations.



Her book details how grandparents struggle, and succeed, to cope with the emotional effects of a life they hadn't imagined with their family being so far away. By some estimates about a million New Zealanders live overseas, and whether they are settled, or living away to use their skills for short- or long-term employment, as a country we can expect that very many parents will spend at least some of their lives separated from their children and grandchildren. This has obviously been exacerbated by the recent effects of Covid

on travel.

Ellis found that there had been very little research on this topic, and set about interviewing many individuals and couples both in New Zealand and overseas to seek stories of how people manage in this situation. The family relationships don't remain static, as jobs change, children grow and locations become different on both sides. Reading how others cope, you learn that you are not alone on your journey, and it can help to support your role as a Distance Grandparent. To reflect on how distance may be experienced by children and grandchildren can create an empathy for how they feel, both the good and the bad.

The book covers myriad issues such as the best strategies for good communication, dealing with guilt, family dynamics, and remaining emotionally resilient. Nurturing relationships may be hard with grandchildren who develop different accents (or even languages), traditions, expectations and have little or no experience with what the grandparents regard as the 'home' country. It is a book that provokes much reflection on the nuances of long distance relationships within families, and two further books are planned for the children's and grandchildren's understanding. Prequal

A number of companies will be familiar Prequal Management Systems. Some of these systems have gained rapid traction amongst a number of large organisations, particularly following the demise of the ACC Workplace Safety Management programmes (WSMP).



To organisations, ACC WSMP certification provided an assurance to customers, contractors, suppliers, peers and the general public that they had an effective Health and Safety System in place.

For many clients this has left a gap of recognition for their level of compliance to Health and Safety requirements.

Currently prequal systems include:

- Sitewise (Construction Industry - Construction Health and Safety NZ CHASNZ)
- Impac Prequal
- Safe 365 (District Area Health Boards)
- SafePlus
- SHE Prequalification

These prequal systems work on the basis that the contracting organisation requires to be assured that the contractor has an effective Health and Safety system in place and, therefore, make prequal qualification part of the purchase decision.

The contractor is then required to sign up to the prequal scheme at

their cost and submit evidence of their H&S practices. Depending on the scheme it must be renewed every year or every two years.

The major criticism of these prequal schemes is that not one of them is universally recognised. This leads to the unfortunate situation where a company may be required to purchase and comply with one or more different prequal systems to gain work as a contractor to large organisations.

The only recognised national and international certification for H&S is an accredited certification to an International Standard such as AS/NZS4801 - 2001, ANZS18001 - 2007 or ISO45001 - 2018. AS/NZS4801 and 18001 have largely been withdrawn and replaced by 45001.

There are some large companies in New Zealand that have gained certification to ANZS45001 - 2018, but many SME's find the work involved too much and the cost prohibitive.

Recently, a new umbrella scheme has been introduced called TOTIKA which is hoped to encompass many of the prequals and be much more widely accepted.

The name Totika come from the Maori - Correct/Effectiveness.

It is a single framework developed by industry (CHASNZ) and Government that brings many health and safety pre-qualifications together under one umbrella to make the process cheaper and quicker for everyone.

West Auckland to get new alcohol retailer brand

West Aucklanders are set to have access to a wider range of liquor retailers under a new move designed to bring greater competition to the region.



For the first time in half a century, consumers will be able to purchase liquor in West Auckland from a retail store that is not operated under The Trusts brand.

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The Waitakere and Portage Trusts in West Auckland are two of 19 licensing trusts operating in New Zealand. Each trust has government-authorised exclusive rights on the development of premises licenses for the sale of alcohol in their area.

The move will see three existing Trusts stores (Te Atatu, Blockhouse Bay and Titirangi) become Liquorland franchises as well as the opening of a new outlet under the Liquorland banner in Hobsonville.

Liquorland is one of New Zealand's largest specialty liquor retailers with over 130 stores nationwide.

The Trusts will operate the four stores as a Liquorland franchisee, following the same purchasing model as other franchisees and providing consumers with access to their national promotions as well as Flybuys and Airpoints loyalty programmes.

Allan Pollard, Trusts CEO, says the move will provide increased consumer choice and is part of a multi-million dollar investment and transformation programme planned for The Trusts retail and hospitality business.

He says the new stores will operate under a hybrid model that increases the level of competition in the region but retains the profits locally to support charitable initiatives.

"Our research shows our communities have a desire for the same retail options as any other parts of Auckland and New Zealand.

"At the same time we have designed this new model to ensure profits from stores operating under the Liquorland brand in the area will continue to be donated to local charities and community groups.

"Our goal is to become a high performing community organisation and the provision of greater choice for our customers is an integral part of achieving this," he says.

Pollard says the locations of the four new stores have been geographically distributed throughout the region to ensure the majority of West Aucklanders will live within a 5km radius.

Brendon Lawry, Liquorland NZ CEO, says the partnership with The Trusts will operate in the same way as their other franchisees, bringing an increased product range to local consumers.

"The Liquorland operating model has a number of core strengths including greater buying power, exclusive brands, and expertise in areas such as premium spirits and craft beer. We are also the largest retailer of gin and whisky in New Zealand.

"We know that there are also around 100,000 Flybuys and Airpoints members in The Trusts area who will now be able to purchase from a local retailer as well as redeem Flybuys rewards.

"The Trusts have adopted the Liquorland model without modification - which is a recognition of the potential impact that the size and scale of a national chain will have on West Auckland," he says.

SH16 bus improvements

Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern was expected to turn the first sod on July 27 to mark construction starting on the State Highway 16 Northwestern Bus Improvements to boost bus transport and reduce

travel times over the next five years.

The joint project between Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency (NZTA) and Auckland Transport (AT) involves first stage changes to road and footpath layouts at the Lincoln Road and Te Atatu highway interchanges, including new bus stops, footpaths and pedestrian crossings.

Bus shoulders on the Northwestern Motorway (SH16) between Westgate and Newton Road will also be extended to make it more reliable to travel by bus along the motorway.

Construction work for this part of the project is due to start this month and be completed late 2022, the works designed to provide "a more reliable, resilient and better-connected bus service for the growing numbers of people who live and work in the Northwest".

The longer-term project includes a new bus station at Westgate to provide better connections and improved travel times further west. However, the detailed design and resource consenting process for this part of the project is expected to begin at the end of the year with construction scheduled to start in 2023.

The bus project is being funded in part by the Government through the COVID Response and Recovery Fund supplying \$50 million of the \$100 million projects to support this work.

Charity women's clothing swap and sale

An annual charity women's clothing swap at the Kumeu Showgrounds on Saturday August 7 is raising funds and awareness for Parent Aid North West, a not-for-profit organisation providing free home help to parents with a new baby or pre-schooler.



Bex Holland of Huapai runs the clothing swap with her mum Kate Hattaway and says to swap you sort out your wardrobe and drop off your clothes/shoes/handbags/accessories, along with a \$20 donation (100% of which goes to Parent Aid North West).

"Then come along on the event day, pick up your wristband at the registration table and you can take away with you the same amount of items which you donated."

Swappers are welcome anytime between 10am and 4pm.

"If you want to take home more than your quota it is just \$5 an item, and you can pay via cash of eftpos at our exit desk," Bex says.

Those who haven't donated goods but who want to buy can attend from 1pm on August 7 and pay \$5 an item.

"From 3pm-4pm we clear the racks, and each item is \$1. This is so we can really help out those that need warm, quality clothing, but that may not be able to afford it currently," Bex explains.

"Grab a wristband from the registration table when you arrive, and then you can head in and shop to your heart's content.

"We always have gorgeous bags, coats, shoes, dresses, tops, jeans - many of them including big brands."

Bex says the event relies heavily on sponsors, with inquiries or offers of help on the day welcome.

"And if anyone has clothing racks, shoe racks, coat hangers (especially the clip ones for pants and skirts), or jewellery stands that they would like to donate, we are always very grateful."

More than 6000 items have been donated this year, making it their biggest swap by far.

Left-over clothes will be donated to Koha Apparel, a 'pay as you can' clothing charity.

The first swap in 2016 comprised mainly family and friends.

"We decided to have it at home, but quickly realised we would have to expand for the next year to fit all the clothes into one room," Bex says.

"We raised \$1200 which went to Women's Refuge, and the left-over clothes we divided between Dress for Success and Women's Refuge.

"In our bigger and better venue in 2017 we raised \$1600 which went to Dress for Success, again with left over clothes going to Dress for Success and Women's Refuge.

"Fast forward to 2018, and the clothes donations we had were more than double the previous year." So it was a quick scramble to acquire some more racks and coat hangers before the big day," Bex adds.

"We raised a whopping \$4135 for the Sophie Elliot Foundation - more than double the two previous years combined."

Left-over clothes that year were donated to Dress for Success and the Massey Community Church.

The biggest year for the clothing swap was 2019 - with more than 300 attendees, sponsors, food, clothes galore, and raising \$15,000 for the Mental Health Foundation.

"Our 2020 event was postponed twice due to COVID-19, but we



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were finally able to go ahead on our third date and we raised a fabulous \$10,000 for Parent Aid North West, while all our clothes left from 2020 were donated to a variety of charity op shops," Bex explains.

She says their kaupapa is to support the local community.

"Clothing is expensive, and we want to make quality clothing accessible to everyone and raise money and awareness for an amazing local charity."

Only quality clothes are accepted as donations and buying second-hand is sustainable and keeps textile waste out of landfills, she adds.

This year the clothing swap has moved to an even bigger venue - The Big Sheds at the Kumeu Showgrounds.

Coffee from Harcourts Coffee and Cone, crepes from Sweet As Crepes, and live music from Lauren Collins are provided, while the day includes two big raffles comprising products and vouchers from many Kumeu and Huapai businesses.

Briana Thompson from Second Life Studio is helping with visitors' styling needs, and a team of volunteers in purple shirts will assist on the day.

Message from Vanushi Walters

We're past the halfway point in the year now and temperatures here in Upper Harbour are certainly starting to drop.

Recent events across Australia and in Wellington have been a good reminder that we are not out of the woods yet with Covid and sticking to the basics is key. That means staying home when you're sick, keeping track of where you've been, practising good hygiene, and wearing a face covering on public transport.

On the bright side, our vaccine roll-out remains on track, with well over a million doses now administered and almost 450,000 people fully vaccinated. Plus our vaccine supply is set to nearly double this month, with an estimated one million more doses scheduled for delivery.

I was pleased to see also this week that another suite of changes has taken effect that will make a real difference for Kiwi families.

My Labour team in Parliament is focused on securing our recovery, so all New Zealanders can emerge from the pandemic stronger



than ever. It's about keeping New Zealanders safe from Covid, accelerating our rebuild, and tackling long-term challenges like child poverty, housing and climate change.


