Greetings

In ancient Greece and Rome a massive repository of useful knowledge, a sort of encyclopaedia of ethics, politics, history and technology was expected of the educated man. People committed large amounts to memory. At that time, any story that would be re-told (such as Homer's Iliad) had to be stored away in someone's memory. As a child, I remember my grandmother reciting poetry that she had learned sixty years earlier. I am grateful that rote learning enabled me to learn multiplication tables. Today it often seems that we remember very little (telephone numbers, birthdays, car routes) as we rely on Google, GPS and YouTube as our sources of information.

We have supplanted our natural internal memory with a vast superstructure of technological crutches that have made our modern world possible. The use of technology has changed how we think and how we use our brains, by using externalised sources of memory. Facts still matter and education is the ability to retrieve information at will and analyse it. In 'Moonwalking with Einstein' (available through Auckland Libraries) the journalist Joshua Foer describes the cultural history of memory. With an average memory, he trained himself in a year with the skills used in classical times (mentally attaching facts to familiar locations) to win the U.S. Memory Championship. Training the memory still has its place.

Does your memory play tricks on you when you are busy? Do you lose track of the time and day? Perhaps you, or someone you know, could do with a clock that prompts you with those details. Do you have time to give to the community? The Community Patrol, the Citizens Advice Bureau, Habitat Hobsonville, the Cat Foundation and the Kumeu Community Garden are all looking for volunteers. That's a lot of opportunities.

Do you need a break? The local travel agents are getting busy. Do you know what the Public Trust does? How much do you know about our local Hospice? Thinking of selling or buying property? Read Graham's Property Report on why you shouldn't delay. Don't forget to read the ideas from our Area Columnists. In fact if you are one of those people who find that the articles that interest you are the ones at the back, this is where you will start!

Show your Poppy

Show your Poppy is a celebration of how we show support/ honour the past and give a nod to the fallen.



"In soldiers' folklore, the vivid red of the poppy came from the blood of their comrades soaking the ground. In England in 1919, the British Legion sought an emblem that would honour the dead and help the living. The Red Poppy was adopted as that emblem and since then has been accepted as the Emblem of Remembrance. The Poppy is strongly linked with Armistice Day (11 November), but the poppy's origin as a popular symbol of remembrance lies in the landscapes of the First World War. Poppies were a common sight, especially on the Western Front. They flourished in the soil churned up by the fighting and shelling."

In 2021 when the country was in Covid lock-down there was a movement that saw New Zealanders' display a poppy on their gate or fence in support of the service given and lives lost. It also gave rise to statements of peace, of thanks and of solidarity. It also saw a greater appreciation by the public other than in RSA's and concrete memorials that this was about communities connecting and making a statement about how they feel and giving a nod to the past. In history books and poems alike, the poppy endures time.

In Flanders fields the poppies blow, Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky, The larks, still bravely singing, fly

Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago, We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie, In Flanders fields.



Take up our quarrel with the foe, To you from failing hands we throw, The torch be yours to hold it high, If ye break faith with us who die

We shall not sleep, though poppies grow, In Flanders fields.

Show your Poppy is a community programme that recognises this social groundswell and ignites a way that public can continue to connect. Hobsonville Let's Reconnect

"Hobsonville Let's Reconnect" is being facilitated again by Hobsonville Community Trust (HCT) and runs through to June 2023. Last year 28 gatherings were held by Hobsonville residents with almost 700 residents attending. Response has been excellent already with over 30 blocks or streets



registered. HCT provides \$100 local food vouchers to any streets, laneways or blocks in the Hobsonville area that want to get together for a neighbours' gathering. Super easy and great way to connect with your neighbours and embrace community. Minimum of 10 households (although a \$50 voucher is available for between 5-10 households). Community Patrol

For the first time in over three years the West Harbour Community Patrol will be conducting a Safer Plates and Tool Engraving event at Hobsonville. This is in conjunction with the NZ Police and Neighbourhood Support. This will be held on Saturday 20th May from 9.00am until 12 noon at the Hobsonville Point



Secondary School front car park, 70 Hobsonville Point Rd. The cost for having the number plates screws replaced with tamper proof screws is only \$4 or free if you are a Gold Card Member. The Tool Engraving is Free of Charge. It only takes apps 5 minutes to change over these screws. Thieves can steal your number plates in two minutes with the standard Philips Head screws.

Over 600 number plates have been stolen off cars in Auckland in the last 12 months. These stolen number plates are used in a series of crimes. Thieves will place them on their own car, fill up with petrol at a station and then drive off without paying. The station security

cameras will record your number plate and you may then get a knock at the door by the Police. Plates are also used in different crimes like ram raids, drive-bys, parking offences etc.

With LED lights having been installed in the main hall over the summer break, the Massey Birdwood Settlers

Association will have a smart looking hall in time for the Association's 100-year celebrations in April 2025.

The Association, formed in 1925, has done much to serve the residents of Massey.

The hall is a resource the Association has provided to the community,



films were played in the early years for the entertainment of children in the area. The first Massey library was started in the Hall back in the 1970's, by members of the Association, before the Waitemata and then the Waitakere City Council took over the running of the library, which is now based down in the Nor West Complex and run by the Auckland Council.

The Association advocated for better bus transport in the days of the Whenuapai Bus and ABC bus companies. The three islands along Don Buck Road, Redhills, Triangle and Royal Road are the result of the advocacy work of the Association and Allen Davies, Warren Flaunty and John Riddell, local government and Council work.

The Association has stood up to various Council's rate rises, ensuring they were affordable, and even today the Association brings roading and transport issues to the attention of Auckland Transport, and raises other issues with Auckland Council and the local board that affects residents and ratepayers of Massey.

At the same time the Hall continues to be well managed and provides many community groups with a place they can call home.

Facebook and Instagram announced a partnership with the National Centre for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) to launch Take It Down, a platform which is aimed at preventing the posting of young people's intimate images online. Take



It Down lets individuals take control of their intimate images by submitting a case that proactively searches for their images on participating apps.

Take It Down is a free service that can help remove or stop the online sharing of any sexually explicit images or videos taken of individuals when they were under 18 years old. It is an anonymous service which will work on public or unencrypted online platforms that have agreed to participate. It is illegal to share sexually explicit images of under-18-year-olds. West Aucklanders are benefiting from Public Trust's innovative and accessible NorthWest Customer Centre.

The centre is off to a positive start since opening in the NorthWest Shopping Centre last year, says Catherine Simpson, Public Trust Head of Service Delivery - Auckland and North.



The team has so far helped a lot of locals make a will or get their enduring power of attorney (EPA) sorted, she says.

For anyone feeling a bit apprehensive about sorting a will or enduring power of attorney, Simpson suggests popping into the centre and asking the friendly team any questions they have.

"We can help them to understand what they might need and let them know the easiest way to do it."

Simpson says the large, flat accessible spaces have been appreciated by the community. The large self-serve screen helps people navigate through products and services easily.

"The centre provides greater ease and accessibility for those in the West Auckland area wanting to tick getting a will or EPA off their todo list," she says.

"We've had the opportunity to meet people who have wandered past and seen us there. We've also seen customers who have opted to come and see us there because it's a convenient location. It has been a very warm reception from the local community," Simpson says.

"We are so happy to be helping people locally in West Auckland. Our centre is in a high-growth area, and next door to a lot of other

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services. There are a lot of new housing developments around and it's just a short drive to most parts of West Auckland like Ranui and Swanson."

The school's walkwise programme is in its early stages of development and will be fully operational once all the connecting roads around the school are completed. The new Joshua Carder extension and pathway through the neighbouring Sustainable Park will allow more of our children and families to walk a lot more safely to school.

On a roll to change lives

Skate boarding has the potential to change a child's life.

Recognising this, a pilot project run by Aroha Skate is underway in West Auckland providing skateboarding lessons for tamariki with disabilities. Supported by Sport Waitākere,

Arohanui School is dedicated to meeting the unique learning needs of students from 5-21 years in West Auckland. Deputy Principal, Mike Edwards, says skateboarding is a great way for people of all ages to get outdoors and build some new skills.

"Skateboarding has many benefits including better coordination, improved balance, increased metabolism, creative freedom and above all, it's social," explains Mike. "This sort of activity builds tamariki's confidence and encourages them to try new things. Without Tū Manawa funding this wouldn't be possible."

Head Coach at Aroha Skate, Felix Ashley Lamb, says skateboarding is



a well-loved activity by today's youth and it is wonderful that schools and communities are catering for their students' skate needs.

Fire and Emergency attend many different types of incidents in support of our communities.

One that we regularly get called to is Motor vehicle accidents.

With the changing weather conditions our roads are made more dangerous when we are in control of heavy machinery that has the capability to cause life changing events if not handled correctly.

With this in mind, we urge you to check the condition of your vehicle, particularly the tyres as these are the only things connecting you to the road.

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The roads can be wet and slippery as we enter the wetter and colder months and with minimal tyre tread or wrong pressures your vehicle handling and stopping can be severely compromised.

We have also seen several speed limit changes in our area and this can cause some frustration and impatience for some drivers wanting to get to the end of the road seconds quicker than what the new speed allows.

Property Property market report

The reported contraction in December 2022 quarterly GDP suggests the economy is buckling a little earlier than expected. Banks expect that in total the economy will contract upwards of 2% by early 2024, more than half the size of the 2008/09 decline. The driver of this slowdown remains the overheating of the economy in response to the pandemic "all-in" stimulus. High inflation and a stretched labour market are the clearest symptoms of this overheating. The Reserve bank has been talking assertively about excessive spending, including lifting the OCR by 50 basis points in early April. With a further OCR increase expected in May. Given the lagged response to OCR increases, as fixed-rate borrowing progressively gets affected, the restraining impact on the economy will continue to lift over the balance of 2023. We expect the Reserve Bank will be in a position to start pulling interest rates down in the first half of 2024, however due to national and international pressures on money and banks, this could be extended. So how does this translate to the market. Listings volumes are down but those on market are spending longer with a for sale sign out the front. Prices are fluctuating due to value being determined by the banks' lending criteria rather than fair market value, and sales are tracking at 50% what we would have seen 12 months ago. That said, sold signs are still being applied and if you do want to get on and off market, don't delay as the election is not far away, and the market always hibernates within a good election build up. Let's look at the sales:

Maintain to gain

To quote from an excellent book about rental investing, written by Bryan M. Chavis, titled "Buy it, Rent it, PROFIT"- "The number one reason tenants renew leases is because of efficient



maintenance responsiveness." If you look at the repairs at your own home. Despite taking good care of your own house, there is always something that needs fixing. This is because no matter how well we maintain our homes, wear and tear is inevitable due to the passage of time, the changing weather and environmental factors.

While your tenants will ensure your investment is bringing you a return, it's important to make sure you're prepared for these costs, it's essential to have a budget for maintenance and repairs that can be easily accessed for any unexpected costs.

When you consider these factors and their impact on your property's bottom line you understand the importance of good maintenance on your property. Issues surrounding maintenance lead to a high proportion of cases at the Tenancy Tribunal.

As a landlord, you are responsible for maintaining and repairing the property to ensure it is safe and habitable for your tenants. Establishing a maintenance fund is a good idea to help cover the costs of routine maintenance and repairs. However, if the damage is caused by the tenant's negligence, intentional actions, or failure to report a problem that led to extensive visible damage, they may be held responsible for the costs of repairs.

At the beginning of every tenancy, we take a bond of four weeks rent, the maximum permitted, from the tenant. This money is put aside in a secure account held by Tenancy Services which we collect as part of our service and forward to the Bond Centre. If a tenant damages your property you are entitled to use this bond money for repairs.

If the extent of the damage goes above and beyond the amount set aside as bond and the tenant is unwilling to pay, we can apply to the Tenancy Tribunal to recoup the costs.

As a general guide, we recommend all our landlords set aside 10 per cent of your rental income each year for repairs and maintenance. This will provide you with a maintenance fund to cover major or minor repairs, or any period of time your property may be vacant.

Having a maintenance fund is becoming increasingly important with legislation such as the Healthy Homes Act. This Act requires all landlords to ensure their rental properties meet a minimum liveable standard. This covers five key areas: heating, insulation, ventilation, draught-stopping and moisture/drainage.

Selling a property when you're splitting up

The end of a relationship is tough emotionally, it's often tough physically, and when it comes to the financials, well it's a whole new level of complexity. After sixteen years of working with couples moving through the process of splitting assets, often the biggest hurdle faced is the decision around the family home. This is in part because it forms a historical and physical bond around so many experiences and so many feelings. Therefore, it's natural to feel a burden of emotion around the decision. It is also natural for one party to entertain buying the other party out, or to consider retaining the property as a rental asset. In my experience couples that can understand the value in the property as early as possible can make better decisions. A registered valuation is highly recommended, but also get two independent property appraisals completed from reputable and AREINZ qualified real estate people. This delivers a complete picture of the property's value range, and a market overview considering the time and the costs to cash-up the property. Having all the facts early helps establish a position for both parties, it allows conversation around one stakeholder buying the other out, or to go to market. You will need representation from your own solicitors, however if you can discuss amicably the best way forward in broad terms the solicitors can mop-up the finer detail. In a defacto relationship without knowing it?

• Do you keep spare clothes in your partner's car or flat?

• Do you keep a spare toothbrush at your partner's house?

• Have you become extra cosy with a flatmate?

• Do friends and family think you're "together"?

Some of these might seem like trivial questions, but in the eyes of the law you could be in a de facto relationship, without even realising it. This means if you and your partner go your separate ways, or you



pass away, your partner could be entitled to half of your property (or more to the point what you thought was "your" property but has now become "relationship property"). This can have major consequences not only for you, but for your family members, including any children who could lose their inheritance (despite what your Will may say).

Being in a de facto relationship isn't always black and white. You can find yourself in one without knowing it, as it can happen gradually. This makes it hard to determine when "dating" ended and a de facto relationship began. You might think one way, but the court may decide otherwise.

In deciding whether a de facto relationship existed, the Family Court considers each case on an individual basis, taking into account nine factors of the relationship, with a different emphasis on each. This includes:

1. Do you stay over or live together? (you could live apart but often stay the night at each other's house)

2. Is there sharing of money or financial dependency? (ie do you pay some of your partner's bills or groceries?)

3. Is there care/support of children? (which may be from previous relationships)

4. Do you own, use, buy or share property together (eg lending your car, sharing furniture, using or sharing chattels etc)

5. Is there commitment to a shared life? (this can be determined in many ways including booking events/holidays in advance, acquiring pets, financial/time/emotional commitments etc)

6. Is there a sexual relationship?

7. Are you viewed by others as a couple?

8. Who performs the household duties?

9. How long have you been together?

Not all of these factors need to be happening in order to fall under the definition and to establish relationship property and a sharing of assets.

When a de facto relationship falls within the definition of the Property (Relationships) Act 1976 and lasts for at least three years, if the relationship ends (due to death or a break-up) there is a presumption of 50% sharing of property. Property can include the family home, savings accumulated during the relationship, kiwisaver/superannuation, joint bank accounts, assets/liabilities which were for mutual use and benefit (eg a car, furniture or credit cards) and assets acquired during the relationship etc. This can result in your partner making a claim against you (or your estate despite what your Will might say).

A flood of issues to consider when buying property

Finished building? Are you getting the right lending?

If you've recently completed a new build then no doubt you love your new home - but you're also most probably exhausted by the process. I've been in my own new build for ten months, so writing from experience.



The last thing you want to do is sit down and work out whether the lending structure

Tenancy – your rights and obligations

Most of us familiar with being either a landlord or a tenant will know about tenancy agreements. This is a written contract between the landlord and tenant. The idea is that this agreement acts as a safeguard for both the tenant and the landlord. However, even in good faith, there can be certain



things written that are not clear or are ambiguous. And, sometimes, when there is a misunderstanding, these unclear parts can cause frustration or friction. When there is a dispute between a landlord and a tenant that cannot be resolved through talking together, either party can apply to the Tenancy Tribunal to help resolve it. A Tenancy Tribunal hearing takes place before an adjudicator (a person whose role is to hear both sides and make a final decision about your case).

A tenancy agreement must include certain minimum information as well as certain statements about the property and recently landlords now have to include statements under the healthy homes standards. Then there are other things that can be included but are not mandatory. For example, a landlord can add a condition about smoking in the property, the maximum amount of people that can live in a house, or keeping pets on the property. These statements or conditions are called clauses but this is where problems can begin. Some clauses written are not enforceable. So why is this?

The Residency Tenancies Act provides the guidelines for agreements but some of the rules are so broad it opens up a gateway of uncertainty. The following are examples of when clauses written in agreements can't be enforced because they are either unreasonable or they are in conflict with the Residential Tenancies Act.

"My tenancy agreement has a clause that states there will be an automatic \$250 deduction from the bond for cleaning at the end of the tenancy. Is this legal?" This is a great example of an unenforceable clause because your landlord cannot require professional cleaning at the end of the tenancy, nor make a deduction from the bond to pay for it. This is because the Residential Tenancies Act states that at the end of your tenancy, you have to leave the property in a reasonably clean and tidy state - and it is only if you fail to do this that the landlord can deduct bond money for cleaning.

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"My tenancy agreement says that I will be charged a late fee if I don't pay my rent on time – can they do this?" Even if your tenancy agreement has a clause that says you will be charged interest or late fees for late payment this would not be enforceable in the Tenancy Tribunal. Your landlord has to follow a process, which may be making a repayment plan that you can afford. However, not paying rent on time does make you in breach of the Residential Tenancies Act and your tenancy agreement so it does need to be sorted somehow.

"My landlord disapproves of some of my friends and says I cannot invite them around. Can they do that?" A tenancy agreement clause saying you cannot have visitors without the landlord's permission would not be enforceable because it would be in breach of your right to quiet enjoyment of the property. What does 'quiet enjoyment' really mean? It means that tenants can enjoy living in a property and enjoy it without any interference or harassment by the landlord. However, it's important to remember that it works both ways. Tenants must also make sure they don't interfere with the peace, quiet and privacy of their neighbours and other tenants. This doesn't mean they can't make any noise, but it's about being reasonable.

When problems do arise it's a good idea to try and address these as soon as possible. Identifying issues early can make it easier to sort out and resolve. The best approach is to have a productive working relationship between both tenant and landlord. Tenants and landlords want the best and neither generally want problems. They can often resolve problems themselves without having to go to mediation or the Tenancy Tribunal. This approach will also be less stressful and less time-consuming.







Three interior home mistakes you don't need to make

As an interior designer, I'm often in people's homes, whether for an entire project or a one-off consultation. I often see the same mistakes made over again. Here are a few...

1. Rugs - If the sofa is barely on the rug or the rug is in front of the sofa, then it's not the



correct size. Another mistake I see is a grouping of furniture with no rug. The furniture looks like it's floating in the space. Rugs are a critical layer and make a massive difference, bringing everything together away from the walls and giving the room structure and balance.

2. Matchy Matchy - In the 1950sa and 60s, it was all about being matchy-matchy. Using the same wood finishes and fabrics in each space. Well, that was then. This is now. The last thing you want to do is create something that looks like it's been ordered from a catalogue. Mix the wood finishes up and let each piece showcase its character.

In terms of fabric, have at least four different fabrics in each space. Seek patterns that evoke a fond memory and make you happy. Muster the confidence and try to throw something discoordinate and unexpected into the mix, and you might be surprised just how much it enlivens the space.



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3. Not Letting Go - If there is a piece that is not working, it's old fashioned, ugly, tired, it's just not right in that space, and you don't love it. It doesn't matter how much money you throw at or around it by purchasing new things for that room. That object is ALWAYS going to steal your thunder. Be tough, and say goodbye.

If it's a piece that reminds you of someone dear, replace it with something more suited to the space that pays homage to this person or memory. Or keep a small part of that object. You might be able to repurpose the handles, the legs or a portion of the fabric.

Cat Flu - Feline Upper Respiratory Infection (URI)

Cat flu is like the common cold in people. The severity of cat flu varies. In some cases, it can be life-threatening, particularly in kittens, and adult cats with underlying illnesses



Symptoms of cat flu? Breathing

problems, Coughing, Discharge from the eyes/nose, Fatigue, Fever, Loss of appetite, Sneezing, Ulcers of the mouth/eyes.

How do cats get cat flu? Cat flu is generally spread by direct contact between cats (saliva, tears, discharge from the eyes/nose). It can also be spread indirectly via contaminated food bowls, bedding, litter trays or human hands. After the flu many cats will remain lifelong carriers of the virus but will show no, or minimal signs of illness

Treatment - Although antibiotics can help with certain complications, there is currently no single cat flu treatment. Instead, cats with cat flu must be isolated from other cats until they are fully recovered.

Snifter Macarons (Spearmint & Spirulina)

With hints of the old time favourite lolly, the snifter, these have a crunchy spearmint outer, a chewy spearmint inner and a solid spearmint infused chocolate centre - delicious! The spirulina was used as a colourant, although you can taste a hint of its flavour too.

Macarons are easy to make but are time-consuming and they can also be easy to mess up. Don't try to make them on a humid day. Freeze-dried



fruit powder and ground and sifted herbal teas make the flavour

combinations endless. They can be filled with any kind of chocolate that is also flavoured with fruit or tea powder or essence or can be filled with butter cream icing. Macarons keep well and make great gifts plus they can also be frozen.

As the method of this recipe is very long and detailed, you can find it on our website under our recipes section. This recipe is from Will Torrent's 2013 book entitled 'Patisserie at Home' and uses the Italian meringue method. The ingredients listed below are for a full batch and I divided the batch in half to make two different flavours.

Other flavour combinations tested were: raspberry, blackcurrant and rose water, coffee with ground hazelnuts added to the macaron mixture in place of some of the ground almond, passionfruit, mango, chocolate, and raspberry on its own. The two most stunning were the raspberry and the passionfruit both filled with dark chocolate.

Macaron Ingredients: 175g ground almonds, 175g icing sugar, 60g egg whites plus 100g egg whites, 200g caster sugar, 1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon spearmint tea ground and sifted, 1 teaspoon spirulina, 1 teaspoon spearmint essence, plus flavouring for the other half of the mixture e.g.: 2 tablespoons freeze dried raspberry powder plus ½ teaspoon vanilla essence.

Ganache Ingredients: To fill both flavours you will need two bowls each containing 100g dark chocolate, 30ml cream, 1 tablespoon butter. Once incorporated into a ganache then add 1 teaspoon spearmint essence to one bowl and 1 tablespoon freeze dried raspberry powder to the other bowl.

The menopause!

Excuse the exclamation mark after "The Menopause!" but it seems to be a very big issue to an important section of our population. The menopause commonly affects women in their early 50s (but can be earlier or later), causing a variety of symptoms that rob women of some of the joy of life. 


Mummy issues

Engaging workers



A common question arises from our clients concerning the differences between the old health and safety legislation - Health and Safety in Employment Act 1992 and the new Act - Health and Safety At Work Act - 2015 (HSAW)?

Whilst the Acts are similar there are three main changes:

1. Coverage - all organisations and workers are included - employees, contractors, trainees and volunteers.

2. Enforcement - The Government appointed Regulator - WorkSafe NZ has a duty to encourage, educate and enforce compliance with the new legislation and if necessary, the powers to prosecute.

3. Involvement – Part 2 Health and Safety duties - Section 36(1) (9a) of the HSAW and Part 3 Worker engagement, participation and representation clearly outline the PCBU's primary duty of care and the duty to engage with workers.

The first two changes involving "Coverage" and "Enforcement" are quite clear and understandable. The third change of "Involvement" requiring engagement with workers appears to be confusing and a step not always seen as necessary and/or taken easily.

It has been seen by some organisations as a relinquishing of management control yet when fully utilised, it empowers all workers to actively contribute to the health and safety of the working environment.

So, what is required?

A safe working environment or lack of one, affects and impacts everyone's safety and wellbeing. Whilst the Person Conducting a Business or undertaking (PCBU) has a primary duty of care, all workers have a responsibility to take reasonable care for his or her own health and safety and ensure that his or her acts or omissions do not adversely affect the health and safety of other persons.

In short, we all have "skin in the game" and a vested interest in the avoidance of harm.

It is also accepted that the workers actually doing the work often know more about the risks, know where the hazards are and what changes occur during the work process - whether it is a machine, a vehicle, a warehouse or a construction site.

The Regulator - WorkSafe NZ understands this and consider engagement and involvement of workers in such matters as health & safety meetings (toolbox meetings), reporting of potential hazards and risk assessment, crucial to the effective management of health



and safety.

It is a priority at every WorkSafe NZ workplace inspection and is always closely examined by the inspector and a critical question at the worker interview.

If the work of a business or undertaking is carried out by less than 20 workers and is not within the scope of any high-risk sector, then a PCBU is not required to initiate the election of one or more health and safety representatives.

However, there is a clear duty to have engagement with workers and open participation practices.

Securo New Zealand actively supports and encourages all clients to incorporate engagement and involvement of workers in health and safety management practices. Securo can also advise on hazard management and provide access to specialist health professionals for health monitoring services.

Hopefully the situation will slowly change. The Minister has met the ferry operators over various operational

Food scraps collection

Auckland Council's food scraps collection service, one of the largest of its kind in Australasia, is rolling out to about 500,000 households over the coming months.

The service will help reduce the amount of organic waste going to landfill by converting



food scraps (rukenga kai) into a renewable resource. It will also reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Once the service is up and running across Auckland, it is estimated to collect around 40,000 tonnes of food scraps per year. This diversion from landfill and carbon emissions savings is equivalent to taking 10,000 mediumsized cars off the road annually.

Food scraps currently make up 45 per cent in weight of rubbish collected from the kerbside, equating to approximately 100,000 tonnes of food scraps going to landfill each year. By residents using the food scraps collection, there is the potential to prevent large amounts of waste going to landfill and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Many people believe that food decomposes in a landfill, so it's okay to put it in your bin. The reality is that landfills are designed to store waste, not to break it down. Home composting is still the preferred option to treat food scraps. However, not all Aucklanders can compost and not all food scraps can be easily composted.

This is where the collection comes in. It will stretch across urban Tāmaki Makaurau and take food scraps that can't be composted or go in a worm farm, including dairy products, meat scraps, citrus peels and bones. Through this collection service, instead of wasting our food scraps, we can process them to make renewable energy and fertiliser to grow more food sustainably.

Some of the vehicles used for the collections will be electric vehicles (EVs) – a new option for waste collection in Aotearoa – with the aim to eventually use more EVs as they become easier to obtain in New Zealand.

After the food scraps are collected by the trucks, they will be consolidated at a facility in Papakura. The scraps will then be trucked

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to the Ecogas food processing plant in Reporoa, the biggest organics processing plant in the country, which is centrally located in the North Island and will also process food scraps from other cities and commercial companies. Distance families: Navigating the U.S. tipping culture

A challenging aspect of visiting America is knowing how to tip. The American tipping culture is unique - foreign to the rest of the world.

As Kiwis we worry we won't have the right change and some of us need our glasses to read banknote values. Many nations, including our own have multicoloured bills making recognition easier. I try to land in the U.S. with a fist full of single bills so I am



somewhat prepared, but they're not so easy to source here. It was a relief on my last visit to find much is digitised now and you can tip with a tap on an iPad.

However, the questions remains... how much, when and where?

Google "CNN how much to tip" for a guide and online test.

In reverse, it is hard for Americans when they travel overseas. Their urge to tip, as per normal, is in-built. One of my first pieces of advice to Americans visiting NZ is there is no need to tip. The difference between America and most other Western countries is that the workers are paid a minimum or living wage. For sure a local waiter appreciates any loose change left on the table and the odd restaurant includes a service fee in their final bill or a glass jar near the cash register - but it's not the norm. I wouldn't dream of tipping my hairdresser but I'll probably give her a bottle of wine at Christmas.

Healthy Families

Community strength and resilience are being highlighted after the recent extreme weather events devastated communities across Te Ika a Maui (The North Island). Like many of the afflicted hāpori (communities), the collective mahi of community champions and organisations has been critical in the recovery efforts in West Auckland.

To aid in the community response, West Auckland Together (WAT) secured funding from Foundation North and JR McKenzie Trust to support community groups at the forefront of West Auckland relief efforts.

MPHS (McLaren Park Henderson South) Community Hub, Waitematā Community Law Centre (WaiLaw), Hoani Waititi Marae, and local iwi Te Kawerau a Maki, all received relief funding, WAT Community Coordinator, Karyn Hill, explains.

"We reached out to our community partners to try and meet the immediate needs of the whānau that were affected."

MPHS community hub became a Civil Defence Evacuation Centre after St Leonards Primary School returned to regular business. The hub temporarily housed whānau and supported those requiring advice and aid from agencies.

The initial clean-up efforts also uncovered a need for legal support around renter's rights and insurance. Waitematā Community Law Centre, a local service in Henderson which provides free legal advice and information, came on board to support those whānau, setting up a mobile service unit to reach families without power or internet access and whose devices were damaged in the floods.

Hoani Waititi Marae's funding went towards supplying essential personal hygiene products and flooding remediation work for the damaged kaumātua flats. Te Kawerau a Maki received funding to support the return to education packs, resources, kai, clothing, and household items identified as a priority for their whanau members.

Collaborating with community partners was essential at this time



and meant that the funds could go directly to groups helping people in immediate need.

Kia Ora. It's my firm belief that future planning is one of the key roles of council. We have again and again seen the impacts of poor planning. Impacts ranging from building in flood zones to allowing development on both sides of Hobsonville Road then deciding the road may need widening. We really need to make sure that the



communities we build are future-proofed.

On some fronts there is more forward planning happening (eg the Supporting Growth North West is working out where we need transport corridors, road widening etc - work that should have been done a long time ago). However, there are other aspects of planning that are just so rushed, they seem the opposite to good planning. The first is the intensification rules forced upon us by central government that has mandated that Auckland Council allow practically any section to have three houses of up to three stories. Following the devastating floods, the council has asked the government for a 12-month delay in implementing these new changes as they will just result in more properties built in floodprone areas. We really need to take a good hard look at how and where we build. Another issue going against good planning in Whenuapai is applications for development under the Covid 19 Fast Track legislation. This is being used by developers seeking to avoid the standard RMA hearing process. Most are out of sync with the anticipated timing and are being done in advance of infrastructure provision. We also don't collect enough development contributions, thus there are more costs on ratepayers in the long term. Whenuapai simply doesn't have the infrastructure for all these piecemeal applications and currently there are no funded plans for rectifying that.

I'm really hoping and pushing for some changes, as we only get one chance to get this right. These views are my own and not the Upper Harbour Local Board. Anna Atkinson (Chairperson).

Back to the basics in education

We recently hosted a wellattended public meeting with Opposition Education spokesperson Erica Stanford. Locals are really concerned about the falling standards of achievement and ongoing truancy.

Erica has launched National's 'Teaching the Basics Brilliantly' policy. It will ensure all kids



have the knowledge and skills they need in reading, writing, maths, and science to set them up for success.

Achievement has been declining for 30 years. One reason is that the New Zealand curriculum is far too loose. Under National, the curriculum will set out the non-negotiable set of knowledge and skills children will need to be taught each year.

A National-led Government will require all primary and intermediate schools to spend an average of an hour a day on reading, an hour a day on writing, and an hour a day on maths. National will also standardise assessment across schools.

Under National, parents will know if their kids are doing well or, more importantly, if they're falling behind. It's not acceptable to allow children to fall behind without anyone noticing. That will change under National.
